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MESSAGE

The more we do, the more we have to do. The year 2018-19 began with higher targets to achieve than the previous years put together. We realized that as India marches ahead on the path to greater technological advancements and higher economic growth, people with disabilities both physical, social and intellectual, senior citizens, transgenders, victims of substance abuse, widows and beggars also need to be enabled to reap all the advantages of the unfolding opportunities.

In response, the Department intensified its efforts to empower them by setting in place new institutions as well as strengthening the ones that exist. The Advanced Rehabilitation Centre (ARC), with state of the art technology for manufacturing custom made prosthetics and orthotics, is an answer to the aspiration of every person with disability to be as physically whole as possible. The State Institute of Empowerment of PwD (SIEP) that has been set up as a registered society has the mandate of social and economic rehabilitation without which creating an inclusive society would remain a utopia. At the root of the problem of persistently low educational achievements of the PwD, lies the dire need of certified special educators. The State Institute for Special Education and Research (SISER) has therefore been established in collaboration with the NCVPD Dehradun. The institute will offer courses certified by the Rehabilitation Council of India. The Braille Press has received substantial funding from the Department for up-gradation to keep up with the growing demand of Braille books. This is a sign that there are more students with visual disabilities in school now. The SIDR together with the RCDRs and DDRCs have served even higher numbers of PwD this year. They have taken Odisha to the third position among all states in the country in UDID certification.

Our collaborations with NGOs, civil society groups as well as FBOs have helped us to reach out to the senior citizens, persons with addictions, children with severe disabilities and in need of care, persons affected by Hansen's disease and transgenders in unique ways. They have helped us understand that we can adopt several approaches, models and processes to achieve our vision of an inclusive, empowering and equal society. We particularly appreciate TATA Trusts, UNICEF-India, Sightsavers-India, Brahmakumaris and VVKI-Art of Living along with so many others who have partnered with us to make the impossible possible.

As I present the Annual Activity Report for 2018-19, I am filled with a sense of achievement as well as humility. I realize that each officer and functionary of this Department has worked as if it were their moral duty and personal responsibility to take care of the senior citizens, persons with disability, persons with addictions, widows, destitute, beggars and transgenders by treating them with dignity while taking care of their needs. 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Chapter 1 INDRODUCTION

Government of Odisha created the Department of Social Security and Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities on the 1st of July 2015. The services provided by the Department focus on measures to improve accessibility and equality of opportunity, promote participation and inclusion and increase respect for the independence and dignity of the persons with disabilities, the elderly, the transgender and those with addictions.

VISION

The Department's vision is to create a social environment that facilitates well-being of the Pensioners, Person with Disabilities, Transgenders, Victims of Substance Abuse and Senior Citizens.

MISSION

The Department's mission is to develop and apply financial, physical, intellectual and social capital for the welfare of Pensioners, Persons with Disabilities, Transgender persons, Victims of Substance Abuse and Senior Citizens by networking and converging with Community Based Organizations, NGOs, Banks, Universities, Corporates, Government Organizations and other stakeholders.

RESPONSIBILITIES

- Understanding and dealing with the causes of poverty rather than its symptoms.
- Providing income support to elderly, widows, persons with disabilities and transgender persons.
- Improving equality and reducing discrimination and disadvantage for the senior citizens, persons with disabilities, persons who abuse substances and transgender persons.
- Encouraging the use of the social model of disability management which is based on the premise that disability is created by barriers in society.
- Encouraging people with disabilities towork and be independent.
- Strengthening organizations that are led by persons with disabilities, senior citizens and transgender persons.
- Coordinating across government departments for implementing the strategy outlined in the Rights of PwD Act,2016.
- Controlling substances which are being misused and are capable of having harmful effects on individual and society. Providing treatment and nurturing social support for persons with substance addictions.

- Removing barriers to equality andhelping to build a just society on issues relating to sexual orientation and transgender equality.
- Supporting transgender persons.

PRIORITIES:

- Run an effective welfare system based on pensions to the elderly, widows, persons with disability, beggars and transgender persons.
- Enable people to achieve financial independence by providing skill development and guidance into employment.
- Work with other government departments to remove barriers so that elderly, widows, persons with disability, beggars and

- transgender people are able to fulfil their potential and participate fully in society.
- Develop working partnerships with disabled people and their organizations.
- Prevent drug and alcohol abuse and the harms it causes. Support persons to recover from dependence on drugs and alcohol.
- Address the discrimination and inequalities that transgender people face. Eliminate transphobic bullying in schools, educational institutions and work places
- Deliver outstanding services to our citizens and claimants.
- Help local organisations build inclusive and accessible communities.

Highlights of Achievements

Capacity expansion for improving the delivery system

- Gram Panchayat Level Workers were trained and deployed for focused delivery of social security services like pensions, scholarships, livelihood support, rehabilitation, and undertaking social audit of programmes. Odisha became the first State in the country to have exclusive extension network for PwD at Gram Panchayat Level.
- Tie ups were made with commercial banks for delivery of cash for pension disbursement to the doorstep of the PwDs and at all Gram Panchayat/ Urban Local Body headquarters for others.
- 336 mega camps were held for door step delivery of assistance such as aids and appliances, scholarships, bus fare concessions, and disability certificates to the PwD. 1,15,187 PwD were assisted including 511 newly married PwD couples who were provided marriage incentive of Rs 50,000 each.
- Special Public Prosecutors were appointed in the Districts under the Rights of PwD Act, 2016.
- To make voting in Parliamentary and assembly elections accessible, ramps were built in polling stations and 36,500 wheelchairs were procured for polling stations.
- In collaboration with Sightsavers India, 7 eye camps were organized for corrective surgery and provision of eye glasses to 922 senior citizens and PwD.
- 1412 awareness camps for drug deaddiction were held and 10,469 victims of substance abuse were detoxified.
- 349 Junior Clerks were recruited, trained and deployed in field offices of 30 Districts.

Expanding the scope of social security support

 Social security pension programme was made universal. 5 lakh additional beneficiaries were disbursed pension at the Gram Panchayats and ULBs in PEETHA scheme. The coverage of pension beneficiaries went up to 48.22 lakhs beneficiaries.

Strengthening implementation of programmes

- Odisha was the first State in the country to take up social audit of the National Social Assistance
 Programme. This was at the direction of the Ministry of Rural Development, Government of
 India. The best practice set by Odisha was followed by other States.
- The capacity of the Braille press was expanded by procurement of modern equipment and hiring of trained manpower at a cost of Rs 1.18 crores.

- State Institute of Special Education and Research was established to promote research training and education in disabilities. This has the potential to become the the hub for PwD research and education for eastern India.
- In collaboration with NGOs, Wellness Centers were opened for Senior Citizens to provide therapeutic services, yoga classes, hobbies development, social interaction, spiritual development, etc. Odisha became the best State in terms of action taken on the Senior Citizens Policy and was made a member of the National Advisory Council on formulation of National Senior Citizens Policy.
- The capacity of homes for the mentally ill homes was expanded to 421 inmates to meet the growing demand for rehabilitation of the mentally ill.
- A network of 64 NGOs has been formed to provide therapeutic and rehabilitation services to 3046 persons with intellectual disabilities.
- 117 government buildings have been retrofitted and made accessible.
- Training cum Production Center to provide employment opportunities to the persons with disabilities has been established. The unit produced 12,876 soaps made by the PwD.
- Vocational training to 3800 PwD was provided by a network of 19 NGOs. In Special ITI at Jatni, 140 PwD students underwent training. Another 331 PwD were trained in various trades and given self-employment kits through NCSCDA, Bhubaneswar.
- 52 new Special Schools and one College were established in the State for students with disabilities with 883 teaching and non-teaching staff at an annual cost of Rs 12 crore. Free books and uniforms worth Rs 80 lakh was distributed to 6455 students with disabilities. Scholarships were given to 41,796 students with disabilities.
- 778 Transgenders, 1751persons with addictions, 3492 beggars and 5846 persons affected by Hansen's disease were rehabilitated.
- 1914 PwD self help groups were formed and given assistance of Rs 1.5 crores for expanding their business.
- To ensure grassroot level functions implementation People's Action Group (PAG) has been appointed at GP level.

Application of IT services

- Submission of Monthly Progress Report (MPR) has been made online.
- 114 Websites of State Government Departments and agencies have been made accessible.
- Offices of CDMOs in the District have been IT enabled with professional staff and equipment

- thereby enabling them to issue 2, 04, 111 disability certificates. Odisha has been ranked the third among all states in the issue of PwD Certificates.
- To strengthen the academic performance of college students with visual disabilities 250 laptops were distributed at a cost of Rs 2 crore.

Use of social media for transparency and accountability

 Activities of the Department of SSEPD which are of public importance were advertized on social media. 388 public grievances were received and resolved through social media. The Department of SSEPD holds the top rank in social media engagement among all other Government Departments with a score of 6.90

Coordination with other Departments

- In collaboration with Transport and Commerce Department driving licenses and bus fare concessions were provided to the PwD. Efforts are on to make buses accessible to the PwD and elderly.
- With the assistance of PR & DW Department houses were built for the PwD and jobs under MGNREGA were provided to the PwDs.
- In coordination with the Department of Health and Family Welfare, Odisha became the third in the ranking of staes in the issue of disability certificates.
- In coordination with the Works Department, 117 government buildings have been made accessible in Bhubaneswar and in ten other major towns of the State. Odisha was the only State to utilize the entire amount of funds provided by Government of India under Accessible India Campaign and submit the UC for Rs 13 crores to the Government of India.
- In collaboration with the Excise Department, capacity building workshops were organized for NGOs working as implementing agencies for prevention of alcoholism and drug addiction in the State. Odisha's Lariapali Gram Panchayat in Sambalpur District was adjudged as the best Gram Panchayat in the country under prevention of alcoholism and drug addiction programme.
- With the support of School and Higher Education Department, scholarships were disbursed to 41,796 students with disabilities.

Formulation of Rules and Policy

Rules under the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act 2016 were notified in the Gazette on

26.06.2018. Odisha was the first State to notify the Rules after the commencement of the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act 2016 on 19.04.2018.

- Equal Opportunity Policy under the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016 has been notified by the Department.
- State Fund for welfare of PwD was notified under the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act 2016.

Establishment of ARC

 Advanced Rehabilitation Center (ARC) has been established at a cost of Rs 11 crore with technical collaboration from a professional implementing agency selected by an open and transparent bidding system. The Center provides advanced physiotherapy services to PWDs and fabricates artificial limbs using time saving advanced computer based systems.

Capital Asset creation

- Construction of Vocational Training Centers have been taken up in Bhubaneswar and Cuttack.
- Construction of Integrated Infrastructure Complex is underway in 7 districts for senior citizens, mentally ill, PwD and others.
- Building construction of SISER has commenced.

Innovations and Internal Efficiency Improvement

- Scorecard and district ranking system has been developed to foster a competitive environment and improve performance.
- Capacity building programmes were held to improve efficiency of field officers including the
 newly recruited Junior Clerks in the Districts and teachers of special schools to keep them
 abreast with the latest government rules, instructions and pedagogical methods.
- In association with Tata Trusts, Anand Multi-Activity Center for senior citizens is being set up.

Public grievance redressal


- Grievance hearing is done on a daily basis for resolving the problems of the PwD, destitute, beggars and others. This has helped in getting feedback on the strengths and weaknesses of the Department and its officers and helped take swift corrective measures.
- A two-day workshop was held in all Districts and the State Capital for the persons affected by Hansen's diseases, for designing a support system for them. On the basis of their suggestions, assistance has been provided to 6527 persons affected by Hansen's disease.

Chapter 2 ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

The Department of Social Security and Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities is headed by the Minister Shri Ashok Chandra Panda. Principal Secretary, Mr. Niten Chandra IAS provides executive leadership to the Department and is responsible for the administration of the Department, development of policy, programme direction, interpretation and evaluation and exercises general supervision over all the major components of Department. The Director of the Department Shri Susanta Mohapatra, IAS,

provides support to the Principal Secretary by coordinating matters in the full range of responsibilities of the Department and is assisted by Joint Secretary Ms. Madhumita Nayak, OAS, Additional Secretary Shri Ajay Kumar Swain, OFS, Deputy Secretaries Shri Jadumani Mahala and Shri Subash Chandra Sarangi and Under Secretaries Shri Duryodhan Behera and Shri Ambika Prasad Pattnaik.

The field organization, which is decentralized to provide services at the local level, includes



District Social Security Officer (DSSO) to assist the Collector in each District and a Sub divisional Social Security Officer (SSSO) in every sub-division. In addition, there are Block Social Security Officer (BSSO) at the Block level who assist the Block Administration in implementing the social security programmes. 421 cadre posts, 521 posts of clerical staff and 30 posts of peons are spread out in different field offices over 314 blocks and 112 ULBs of the State.

The SSEPD Department has 349 Junior Clerks who are deployed in field offices in 30 Districts. With the aim of focused delivery of social security services like pensions, scholarships, livelihood support, rehabilitation, and undertaking social audit of programmes. Odisha became the first State in the country to have exclusive extension

network for PwD at Gram Panchayat Level.

For the creation of synergy among all social security officers towards achieving Departmental goals and setting priorities and at the same time avoiding overlaps and filling gaps, a one-day conference of all DSSOs is held in the state headquarters every month. There are regular orientation and training programmes for the Block Social Security Officers and field staff at state headquarters to inspire them to be adept at their job responsibilities, departmental procedures and most importantly to provide timely service. As representatives of the Department in the field and the face of the Government to the beneficiary, the social security officers are the pivotal functionaries of the Department of SSEPD.

Chapter 3 POLICIES OF THE DEPARTMENT

SENIOR CITIZENS POLICY

The Odisha State Senior Citizens Policy 2016 in consonance with the National Policy for Senior Citizens 2011 reiterates the commitment of the State of Odisha in ensuring its citizens that they are able to age with security and dignity and continue to participate in society as citizens with full rights. It emphasizes eight areas of intervention, namely income security in old age, health care, safety and security, housing, productive ageing, welfare, inter-generational bonding and enhancing involvement and participation of media on ageing issues. The issues of the senior citizens are cross-sectional

and demands strategic partnership across government departments, the public and private sectors, the non-governmental organizations, voluntary organizations, civil society and local communities.

For the implementation of the Odisha State Senior Citizens Policy 2016 and the maintenance and welfare of Parents and Senior Citizens Act 2007 a State Council under Chairmanship of the Minister, Department of SSEPD has been formed. This council will plan, monitor and make recommendation on programmes meant for the welfare of the Senior Citizens in the State. A high level Coordinator Committee has also been

constituted under the chairmanship of the Principal Secretary Department of SSEPD.

According to Section 18(1) of the "The Maintenance and Welfare of Parents and Senior Citizens Act, 2007", the State Government has declared the District Social Security Officer (DSSO) of the concerned District as "Maintenance Officer" to represent a parent if he so desires, during proceedings in the Tribunal or Appellate Tribunal.

The Collector and District Magistrate is the Ex Officio Chairman of the District Committee with Additional District Magistrate, Superintendent of Police, P.D, DRDA, Chief District Medical Officer and Sub-Collector as Ex-Officio Members. The DSSO functions as the Member Secretary Ex-Of fiction. Specialists & Activists in the field of welfare of Senior Citizens, NGO Representatives running Old Age Homes or Day Care Centers or any other IPSC Project and Eminent Senior Citizens have been included as Members.

For the welfare and protection of Senior Citizens. Senior Citizen Security cells are functional in all police station of the state.

PwD POLICY

The disability policy of the Government of Odisha is based on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act 2016 and ensures equality of opportunities by providing an enabling environment, access to education, eliminating discrimination, involving them in the formulation and execution of programmes, encouraging their participation in public life and meeting their needs through services and facilities.

It develops and promotes strategy on disability across government departments and organizations as per the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act 2016 and works in partnership with other organizations and institutions to showcase approaches to social, economic and public participation and share learning through joint projects.

The Department runs campaigns on various disabilities to strengthen and protect disabled people's rights.

PENSION POLICY

To reduce the risk of falling into poverty, social security pension is a non-contributory regular payment from the government that one can claim if one's annual income is below the poverty line when he/ she reaches sixty years of age; is a widow or a widow of a person who has died of AIDS; is a person with disability or a person who has had Hansen's Disease.

The Government of Odisha has its own pension scheme the Madhu Babu Pension Yojana alongside the Government of India's National Social Assistance Programme. It has modernized pension disbursal though AADHAR seeding of existing lists to make it hassle free, timely and to ensure that everyone included in it is able to enjoy a secured life.

TRANSGENDER POLICY

On the basis of a survey of transgender people commissioned by the Department the transgender policy of the Government of Odisha has been launched. The Department of SSEPD aims for an inclusive society which promotes equality, values diversity and promotes an environment where the rights and dignity of all its citizens are respected regardless of gender.

The Department takes steps to improve the visibility of the transgender population and decrease trans-phobia by creating avenues for their increased participation in public life. The transgender community is encouraged to participate in all public events organized by the Department of SSEPD.

The innovative scheme like SWEEKRUTI has been launched by the Department for transgender persons that provides pre-matric

and post matric scholarships, skill and personality development training, financial support to parents and self-employment opportunities.

The Department also ensures that there is convergence and synergy among all Departments and Government organizations towards extending their services to them. They are thus included as individual beneficiaries under the National Food Security Act administered by the Food and Civil Supplies Department and all Municipal Corporations of the state provide basic civic amenities to their residential colonies.

BEGGAR REHABILITATION POLICY

Odisha has the highest population of beggars in the country after the state of West Bengal. According to Census 2011, Odisha has a total of 6550 beggars many of whom are children. In

response to this situation, the Government of Odisha, Beggar Rehabilitation Policy recognizing that beggars are a valuable human resource for the society, seeks to create an enabling environment that provides equal opportunities, protection of their rights and full participation in society. This policy is based on the Persons in Destitution (Protection, Care and Rehabilitation) Model Bill of 2016 of the Government of India. The beggar rehabilitation policy focusses on the following broad objectives:

- 1. To create an enabling environment to ensure equal opportunities, equity, social justice & empowerment of beggars.
- 2. To encourage voluntary action and participation of all stake holders for ensuring effective implementation of the scheme.
- 3. To expand outreach activities for rehabilitation of beggars and create facilities

for providing appropriate rehabilitation services.

- 4. To promote individual and group initiatives by beggars for employment, self-employment and other socio-educational services.
- 5. To facilitate care of children of beggars including leprosy affected persons and encourage mainstreaming of their daughters.
- 6. To strengthen the existing implementation machinery and create facilities for coverage of all uncovered areas of the state for ensuring complete coverage of beggars.

The policy also suggests that law enforcement will not be punitive but rehabilitative in nature. Under this rehabilitative approach, the Government will organize the following programmes:

- 1. Survey & Identification
- 2. Assistance to Parents
- 3. Pre & Post Matric Scholarship
- 4. Skill development training

- 5. Self-employment kit
- 6. Self Help Group
- 7. Rehabilitation Centers
- 8. Outreach & Mobilization Unit
- 9. Mainstreaming Award
- 10. Marriage Incentives & Support
- 11. Sensitization of Workers & Activists
- 12. Community Awareness Campaign
- 13. Research & Documentation

These programmes are to be implemented through, registered Voluntary Organizations or Non-Governmental Organizations, Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs), Urban Local Bodies / institutions managed or funded by State / Central or a local body, a registered Public Trust, a company established under Section 25 of the Companies Act, 1956 or any other well established organizations/ institutions which may be approved by the State Government and which can establish and administer the rehabilitation centers.

RESERVATION POLICY RESERVATION IN EMPLOYMENT

Reservations to persons with disability are provided in line with the provisions of the Rights of Persons with Disability Act, 2016 in posts and services of the Government of Odisha and in Public Sector Undertakings against identified posts. Not less than four per cent of the total vacancies in the cadre strength in each group of posts are filled with persons with benchmark disabilities of which, one percent each shall be reserved for persons with benchmark disabilities under clauses (a), (b) and (c) and one percent for persons with benchmark disabilities under clauses (d) and (e) namely;

- (a) blindness and low vision
- (b) deaf and hard of hearing
- (c) locomotor disability including cerebral palsy, leprosy cured, dwarfism, acid attack victims and muscular dystrophy
- (d) autism, intellectual disability, specific learning disability and mental illness
- (e) multiple disabilities from amongst persons under clauses (a) to (d)

Jobs suitable for different categories of disabilities have been identified vide General Administration Department Notification No. 34450 dated 3rd December 2013. An Employment monitoring Cell has been constituted in the Department of SSEPD to monitor the reservation for PwD by the recruitment agencies.

RELAXATION IN AGE LIMIT

To compensate for the years lost in

overcoming the disability, the Government of Odisha has Approved a ten-year relaxation in the upper age limit of the for the PwD in Government employment opportunities.

RESERVATION IN HIGHER EDUCATION

To provide equality of opportunity to the PwD in accessing higher education, Not less than five per cent reservation of seats in Government and Government aided institutions of higher education such as colleges and universities has been provided.

Department also give direction to Vice Chancellors and Registrars of Universities and Principals of Colleges to establish Equal Opportunity Cells in their institutions in accordance with Section-21 of the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act 2016 and The UGC (Promotion of Equity in Higher Education Institutions) Regulation Act, 2012. These Cells are to prepare barrier free procedures for admission of students belonging to the disadvantaged groups of society including persons with disabilities.

RESERVATION IN POVERTY ALLEVIATION PROGRAMMES

A five per cent reservation for PwD in all poverty alleviation programmes including Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana, Biju PakkaGhar Yojana and Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme has been provided by the Government of Odisha as per statutory provisions.

Chapter 4 STATUTORY BODIES

THE STATE COMMISSION FOR PERSONSWITH DISABILITIES

The State Commission for Persons with Disabilities (SCPD) has been created as per Section 60 of the Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights and Full Participation) Act, 1995 with a mandate to take steps to safeguard the rights and services made available to people with disabilities. Presently it is headed by Shri Niten Chandra, IAS, This quasi-judiciary office points out the violation of the rights of the Persons with disabilities by different

agencies and monitors the utilization of funds disbursed by the State Government and the services that people with disabilities are entitled to. The State Commissioner takes suomotu cognizance of the violation of the rights of the persons with disabilities and issues notices to the erring parties. The SCPD also takes steps to increase awareness among stakeholders and service providers towards the implementation of the provisions of the PwD Act of 1995 and The Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016.

THE STATE CO-ORDINATION COMMITTEE UNDER THE RIGHTS OF PwD ACT OF 2016

The State Government has enacted Persons with Disabilities (Equal opportunities, Protection of right and full participation) Orissa Rules, 2003 to carry out the objectives defined by the Rights of PwD Act of 2016 including the constitution of the State Coordination Committee. A meeting of the State Coordination Committee of the PwD Act was held under the Chairmanship of Sri. Prafulla Samal, Minister, Department of Social Security and Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Government of Odisha.

It reviewed the activities of all the Departments of Government and other Governmental and Non-governmental Organizations and outlined their mandates on matters of concern to people with disabilities. It deliberated on necessary policy changes in keeping with the Rights of PwD Act 2016 and suggested measures to ensure equality and improve the full participation of persons with disabilities. Notable among the decisions were steps to ensure barrier free environment in all public places, work places, public utilities, schools and other institutions; access to information, transportation, physical environment, knowledge, communication

technology and services including emergency services; Insurance, Health Care, Safety and opportunities for Education, Vocational Training, Employment and Rehabilitation.

THE STATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE UNDER THE RIGHTS OF PwD ACT OF 2016

The State Executive Committee is the executive body of the State Coordination Committee and is responsible for carrying out the decisions of the State Coordination Committee. The Principal Secretary and Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Sri. Niten Chandra IAS, chaired the meeting of the State Executive Committee of the Rights of PwD Act of 2016.

It is to be noted that Odisha is abreast with the newly enacted legal provisions of the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act 2016. The mandate of each Department of the Government of Odisha with regard to issues of concern to persons with disabilities was reiterated and the representatives of the Government Departments and institutions, non-governmental organizations and educational institutions were urged to be alert, pro-active and execute them with sincerity and enthusiasm.


STATE INSTITUTE FOR DISABILITY REHABILITATION

The State Institute for Disability Rehabilitation (SIDR) at Bhubaneswar is the nodal agency for disability rehabilitation in the state and monitors and guides the District Disability Resource Centres functioning in eight districts of the state. It provides specialized medical and social rehabilitation services to persons with physical disabilities. It has staff specialized in orthopedic, intellectual, visual and speech and hearing disability treatment. Psychological counselors and social workers ensure that they are rehabilitated in their families and mainstreamed into society through education, skill development and self-employment. It also

distributes and fabricates aids and appliances as per the requirement of its clients. Specialized equipment such as Brainstem Evoked Response Audiometry (BERA) are used for maintaining precision in assessment. In the year 2018-19, the SIDR was allocated ₹. 240.17 lakh for its various activities.

This year the SIDR has carried out assessments of 72,645 persons with disability and provided therapeutic treatment services to 34,092 persons, surgical correction to 3270 persons and aids and appliances to 15,002 persons. These figures are the highest in any year so far.


To provide specialized services at the doorstep of the PwD, the SIDR organizes camps in locations convenient for the PwD to reach. This



REGIONAL CENTRE FOR DISABILITY REHABILITATION (RCDR) AND DISTRICT DISABILITY REHABILITATION CENTRE (DDRC)

The Regional Centres for Disability Rehabilitation and the District Disability Rehabilitation Centres (DDRC) function as extensions of the State Institute of Disability Rehabilitation. There are two RCDR to cater to the Northern and Southern Revenue Divisions respectively. The Model Nodal Centre for Corrective Surgery to coordinate corrective surgery camps throughout the state is located at Phulbani in Kandhamal. Five more DDRC are located in Baripada, Bhawanipatna, Nawarangpur, Koraput and Khordha.

ADVANCED REHABILITATION CENTRE (ARC)

In order to address the demand for high quality prosthetics and orthotics from persons who have musculoskeletal disorders as well as persons who have lost limbs as a result of traumatic injuries, vascular diseases, cancer or congenital disorders, the Department of Social Security & Empowerment of persons with Disabilities has established the Advanced Rehabilitation Centre (ARC) in SIDR Building, Capital Hospital Campus, Bhubaneswar at a cost of ₹ 19.49 crore. It has one Advanced Robotic Neuro Rehabilitation System for Upper Limb & Lower Limb (Lokomat Pro & Armeo spring) and one CAD-CAM (Bio-sculpture)





STATE INSTITUTE OF SPECIAL EDUCATION AND RESEARCH (SISER)


SISER is a joint venture of the National Institute for the Empowerment of Persons with Visual Disabilities (NIEPVD), Dehradun, (Under the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India) and the Department of Social Security and Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (SSEPD), Government of Odisha. It was formerly known as the Training Centre for the Teachers of the Visually Handicapped (TCTVH).

The SISER offers a two year Diploma in Special Education (Visual Impairment) with an intake capacity of 25 trainees per year. So far 596 trainees/Special Educators have passed out from the Centre. Apart from the regular two years diploma course, the Centre also imparts different Short Term & Refresher Courses to update the special school teachers. In March

2018, refresher courses on the Right to Education and on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act 2016 were conducted.

It receives grant-in-aid from the Department of SSEPD to manage the State Talking Book Library. The Library has prepared CD Audio-Text Books for Class-IX and Class-X and distributed 277 copies of CDs to the students with visual disabilities and Special Schools of the State. SISER also houses the Regional Sales Counter of Braille products of the NIEPVD, Dehradun.

The Department of SSEPD provides admission and examination fees to all the PwD trainees of SISER in addition to post-matric scholarship of the Government of India. During the year under report 35 trainees have been given fee exemptions. The 32 trainees with visual disabilities have been provided with Laptops with JAWS software by the Department of SSEPD.

STATE INSTITUTE FOR EMPOWERMENT OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES (SIEP)

The State Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (SIEP) has been set up by the Department of SSEPD, Government of Odisha in 2018 as a state level Society, registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860.

Its vision is to create an inclusive and enabling society where every person with disability has the opportunity to participate fully in society. Its mission is to develop models of comprehensive rehabilitation for Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) in the state of Odisha. SIEP shall work in partnership with various stakeholders including Government agencies and Departments, as well as NGOsand academic institutions.

It shall offer a whole bouquet of services including early intervention, auditory training, speech & language therapy, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, psychological interventions, educational intervention, vocational training, counselling services to

parents of CwD, library and Art lab facilities to the PwD. During the year 2018-19 an amount of rupees 550 lakh has been allocated to the SIEP.

STATE FUND FOR PwD

In pursuance of the provisions of Section 88 of the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016 and Rule 32 of Odisha Rights of Persons with Disabilities Rule, 2018, the State Fund for PwD has been created during the year 2018-19 with an initial allocation of 200 lakh. The State Fund for the PwD held it first Governing Body meeting on the 12th of November 2018 wherein it was decided to modernize the Braille Press with a grant of ₹ 1.19 crore and support the Research Programmes and Activities on different components of rehabilitation and the needs of Children with Disabilities. Ms. Manjulata Dash, representative of AOOHWA and Shri Bijay Parida representative of OAD were inducted as nominated members of the Governing Body for two years until October

SPECIAL SCHOOLS

Special education schools enable students with severe disabilities and special needs to have equitable access to learning and opportunities to pursue and achieve the goals of their educational programs. There are 51 special schools (Annexure-1) catering to 3,213 students with disabilities in Odisha that are supported by the Department of SSEPD. 11 of these schools are for children with intellectual disabilities, 18 for children with hearing disabilities and 22 for children with visual disabilities. Four Special Schools, located at Bhubaneswar and Burla are managed by the Department of School & Mass Education, Government of Odisha. The special schools have 345 special educators along with 257 support staff. In the year 2018-19 a budget provision of ₹ 3249.76 lakh was made.

Though the Department encourages an inclusive education system special schools are promoted to include those students who clearly need a special environment and a special education programme (IEP) other than those available in normal schools. This year the Department has extended its support to 52 new Special schools (Annexure-2) and one college through grant-in-aid to meet the growing need for quality special education. There are 3,223 students in the special schools and 883 sanction posts for teaching and non-teaching staff.

The Government of India provides grant-in-aid to 46 Special Schools under the Deendayal Disabled Rehabilitation Scheme (DDRS). (Annexure-3)

SPECIAL INDUSTRIAL TRAINING INSTITUTE (ITI) FOR PwD

The Special ITI for persons with disability offers full-time vocational courses approved by the National Council of Vocational Training in trades such as Electrician, Fitter, Computer Operator & Programme Application and Dress Making. The trainees are recommended to the Special ITI from districts all over the state and receive a scholarship of ₹ 350 per month. 140 students with disability are pursuing these courses. In 2018-19 the Special ITI received ₹ 80 lakh towards programme expenses.

COMPUTERIZED BRAILLE PRESS

In the current year the Braille Press has printed 17,000 Braille text books for Class I to Class VIII for OPEPA at no-profit-no-loss basis, for free

distribution in Special Schools. The Braille Press has also produced 2,000 Odia Braille Calendars for the year 2019 which were again distributed gratis to persons with visual disabilities. The most significant achievement of the Braille Press during the year 2018-19 has been the printing of 42,200 (84,400 Braille pages) of Braille Ballot Sheets for General Elections, 2019.

The Department of SSEPD has taken special initiatives to upgrade the Braille Press by increasing the staff strength from four to seven and providing funds for the construction of an Embosser Room. It also contributed ₹ 1.19 crore towards the procurement of new equipment for modernization of Braille Press in addition to the support by Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India.

ANAND MULTI ACTIVITY CENTRE

The Department of Social Security of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities has taken an initiative to start a multi facilitated wellness centre for destitute, persons with disabilities, transgender, senior citizens and persons affected by substance abuse to showcase and improve their skills, get engage and be aware of their rights and entitlements.

The upcoming public services complex will be located at BMC Bhawani Mall in Saheed Nagar, Bhubaneshwar. The infrastructure will be in an area of 14000 square feet which would provide a one stop solution for health and wellness, skill development and livelihoods promotion. It will have commercial outlets, health-care centre, counter to facilitate Aaddhar, PAN and Voter IDs for Senior Citizens besides re-creational zones with library or reading rooms facility.

NATIONAL CAREER SERVICE CENTRE FOR DIFFERENTLY ABLED (NCSCDA)

The NCSCDA under the DGE&T, Ministry of Labour collaborates with the Department of SSEPD for the skill development and employment of persons with disabilities. The NCSCDA assesses the residual capacity of the persons with disabilities and recommends suitable non-formal training or skill development training.

In collaboration with the Department of SSEPD and the Odisha Skill Development Authority, Government of Odisha, it offers short term skill development courses in eight trades viz. -

- (1) DTP and Print Publishing Assistant
- $(2)\,Integrated\,Course\,in\,Hair\,Skin\,and\,Makeup$
- (3) Ornamentalist and Handwork Specialist Applique

- (4) Electrician Domestic
- (5) Repairing and Maintenance of Personal Electronic Devices
- (6) Arc and Gas Welding
- (7) Hospitality Assistant
- (8) Repairing & maintenance of Refrigeration and Air Conditioning.

In the year 2018-19, the NCSCDA has trained a total of 331 PwD. A 192 of the successful trainees were provided self-employment tool kits sponsored by the Paradeep Port Trust (PPT) and Odisha Mining Corporation (OMC.) Many have started earning their livelihood.

The trainees are provided employment opportunities through www.ncs.gov.in portal and inclusive job fairs or placement drives.

In 2018-19, seven Inclusive Job Fairs were organised in collaboration with the Department of SSEPD, District & State Employment Exchange, skill providers, local services providers, and other partner organisations. A total of 1095 applicants including the PwD had been shortlisted in these fairs and while 4 PwD were successfully placed 5 others were employed at the NCSCDA itself.

The NCSCDA has received a financial grant of ₹ 32 lakh for constructing a 200 bed mushroom cultivation and vermin-cultivation shed. In the

year 2018-19 only 20 PwD were provided a two weeks long residential Training in Mushroom Cultivation at NCSCDA. This facility will have the capacity to train 500 PwD per year.

The Department of SSEPD has sanctioned a grant of about ₹ 17 crores to construct a G+6 hostel having dormitory accommodation for about 350 PwDs and 30 twin sharing officers rooms along with well-furnished 3 conference halls. It is under construction and will be completed by end of 2019.

SUCCESS STORIES

Employment opportunity for Persons with Disabilities in the private sector has improved dramatically in the last few years especially in the cities and metros. Ms. Aski Hembram is one such example. With an education up to the 9th standard she had gone through the counselling process at NCSCDA and based on the interest taken admission in Ornament Designing and Handwork Specialist Appliqué. During her two and a half months training she acquired skills to stitch and design handkerchief, petticoat, salwar suit, baby dresses, night gown etc. Based on her practical knowledge and she got employed with Shahi Exports at a monthly salary of Rs.6,300. Now, she feels independent and no more a burden on her family. She harbours dreams of establishing her own shop.

Sri Pradeep Choudhary aged about 39 years, has 60 per cent locomotor disability. He hails from a BPL family in Kuchinda village of Sambalpur district. He is a matriculate and learnt about Skill Development Training at the NCSCDA during a camp. He was assessed and recommended for training in Electric Devices trade where he learnt the techniques to repair devices such as fan, refrigerator, grinder, washing machine, iron, house wiring, battery maintenance etc. Later on, he started his own shop and now has an average monthly income of about Rs.10,000/-to Rs.15,000.

Chapter-6 Schemes and Services

1. PENSION SCHEMES

1.1 MADHU BABU PENSION YOJANA (MBPY)

To compensate for the loss of earning capacity of citizens such as the elderly, diseased, invalid and widows and to protect them from impending destitution the State Government has instituted the Madhu Babu Pension Yojana since 2008.

Its beneficiaries in particular are persons whose annual family income does not exceed ₹40,000 and are either above 60 years of age, a widow irrespective of age, a leprosy patient with visible signs of deformity, a PwD above 5 years of age,

enhanced to include 28,13,704 beneficiaries and the programme expenditure has been ₹1,12,213.40 lakh. (Annexure-4)

1.2 NATIONAL SOCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAMME (NSAP)

This programme provides social assistance to the poor with the aim of ensuring a minimum national standard in addition to the benefits that the states are currently providing or might provide in future. It provides pensions from public funds to citizens in case of unemployment, old age, sickness, disablement

and in other cases of undeserved want. It comprises of four schemes as listed below. For the eligibility and financial assistance of each of the schemes refer (Annexure-5.)

INDIRA GANDHI NATIONAL OLD AGE PENSION SCHEME (IGNOAPS):

For persons below the poverty line and above the age of 60 years, a monthly pension of ₹ 500 is provided until the age of 79 years and ₹ 500 thereafter. In the current year ₹ 60,993.53 lakh has been provided under the State Plan to cover 14,18,631 beneficiaries.

INDIRA GANDHI NATIONAL WIDOW PENSION SCHEME (IGNWPS):

Provides assistance to widows below the poverty line and between 40 to 79 years of age at the rate of ₹ 500 per month. In the current year a provision of ₹ 18483.36 lakh has been made under the State Plan to cover 5,10,095 beneficiaries.

INDIRA GANDHI NATIONAL DISABLED PENSION SCHEME (IGNDPS):

This scheme provides a pension of ₹ 500 per month to persons with severe and multiple disabilities below the poverty line and aged between 18 to 79 years. The Government Odisha provides an additional amount of ₹ 200 per month each beneficiary. This year 79,645 beneficiaries were covered and a budgetary provision of ₹ 5626.13 lakh has been made under the State Plan

NATIONAL FAMILY BENEFIT SCHEME (NFBS):

In this scheme a one time assistance of ₹ 20,000 is given to a household below the poverty line that has lost its primary bread winner who was aged

between 18 and 64 years. During the year 2018-19 an amount of ₹ 4922.20 lakh has been utilized to cover 24.611 beneficiaries.

2. SCHEMES AND SERVICES FOR THE PwD

2.1 BHIMA BHOI BHINNAKSHYAMA SAMARTHYA ABHIYAN (BBSA)

The BBSA adopts a multi-pronged approach to empower Persons with Disabilities by removing the constraints they face in accessing public services. It thus provides multi-sectoral services to PwDs on a campaign mode through a single window approach.

BHIMA BHOI SAMARTHYA SHIVIRS

In the current year 267 camps have been organized at the district level with the sanctioned amount of ₹ 2000 lakhs. These camps

have proved useful for persons with disabilities as 2,13,840 persons with disabilities have been registered and another 1,29,500 have been assisted. These camps have provided preassessment services for disability detection and evaluation leading to a supply of aids and appliances to 23,764 PwD. Services such as income certification and transport concession; selection of PwD for skill training, bank linkage for loans and pension schemes were also provided during the camp. Children with disabilities were also identified for school enrolment.

UNIFORMS FOR STUDENTS IN SPECIAL SCHOOLS

Students enrolled in the 103 special schools aided by the Department of SSEPD are provided with two sets of uniform inclduding footwear. In the current year an amount of ₹ 80 lakh had been provisioned for providing uniform and clothing to 6436 students with disability.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR THE CHILDREN OF PWD WHO ARE PURSUING HIGHER EDUCATION

Under BBSA, children of PwD with annual income below ₹50,000 pursuing higher education (above Class 10) are assisted with a scholarship of ₹350 per month for a maximum period of ten months in an academic year.

2.2 GRANT-IN-AID TO SPECIAL SCHOOLS

To provide free and compulsory elementary education to children with disabilities as mandated in Section (3)1 of the Right to Education Act 2009, the Department of SSEPD after having assessed 46 Special Schools had recommended them for Grant-in-Aid to the Government of India. (Annexure-3) The grant in aid payable to an institution includes maintenance of residential and non-residential

students and remuneration of teaching and non-teaching staff as determined by the Government. The Department also facilitates getting these schools recognized from the competent authority under the Education Department as per procedure and helps them obtain affiliation from the Board of Secondary Education or Council of Higher Secondary Education. It also determines the curriculum for teaching/training in conformity with minimum standards of learning.

2.3 MISSION KSHYAMATA

To help persons with disabilities to become financially self reliant Mission Kshyamata facilitates formation of exclusive Self Help Groups of PwDs. It is a sub component of Mission Shakti and permits smaller groups to be formed with five to six members who are PwD or are parents of persons with mental lsy.

retardation, mental illness, autism or cerebral palsy.

A onetime grant of ₹ 20, 000 is given to each group as revolving fund to augment their resources and as an encouragement to take up trading activities. This year 1959 more SHGs have received funding from Mission Kshyamata. Apart from financial assistance, these groups have received basic skill training and orientation training on book keeping, marketing, management, etc.

2.4 HOSTELS FOR WOMEN WITH DISABILITY

To meet the special accommodation needs of outstation women with disability who are employed in Bhubaneswar and to create access for women with disabilities to higher education in the cities of Bhubaneswar and Cuttack, the Department of SSEPD has established hostels exclusively for them. A hostel for 50 women students with disabilities has been established in the Ramadevi Women's University in Bhubaneswar. A similar facility is coming up in the Sailabala Women's Autonomous College in Cuttack for

which an allocation of ₹800 lakh has been made. A hostel for working women with disabilities is situated in Bhubaneswar and managed by the State Social Welfare Board. It has a capacity of accommodating 58 residents.


2.5 SCHOLARSHIPS

BANISHREE SCHOLARSHIPS

The Government of Odisha encourages the Persons with Disabilities to continue their education and provides for scholarships, fee exemptions, allowances and concessions to students with disabilities from primary level to higher education including technical and vocational education.

A scholarship of ₹ 200 per month to primary school students; ₹ 250 per month to high school and secondary school children; ₹300 per month to senior secondary and under-graduate students; and ₹350 per month to post graduate students, students pursuing technical and short term vocational training. A reader allowance ranging from ₹ 100 to ₹ 200 per month is given to visually impaired students if they employ a reader. A transport allowance of ₹ 100 per month is granted to orthopedically impaired students having 75% or above disabilities. This is a continuing scheme and presently covers 37,768 students. An amount of ₹1290.26 lakh had been allocated for this scheme in the year 2018-19. (Annexure-6)





EXEMPTION OF TUITION FEE AND OTHER RELATED FEES


The Government of Odisha has exempted tuition fees and other related fees for higher studies/ technical studies for students with visual impairment who use Braille; hearing and speech impairments and; with orthopedic disability of more than 75 per cent.

PRE-MATRIC, POST-MATRIC AND TOP CLASS SCHOLARSHIP

Pre-matric Scholarship comprises a monthly maintenance allowance of ₹ 350 per month for day scholars and ₹ 600 for hostellers; along with a book grant and travel and reader allowances. Presently, the number of students with disabilities receiving pre-matric scholarship is 1360.

Post-matric Scholarship ranges from ₹ 230 to ₹500 for day scholars; and ₹ 380 to ₹1200 for hostellers. This scholarship was availed by 1600 number of students with disabilities in the year 2018-19. (Annexure-6)

Top Class Scholarship for post graduate students includes a monthly allowance of ₹1500 for day scholars and ₹3000 for hostellers along with a book grant of ₹5000 per annum and tuition fee up to ₹2 lakh. The Department is committed to making higher education accessible and inclusive for PwD with different requirements and is expecting an increase in the number of top class scholarships in the coming years.

2.6 FREE LAPTOP AND VOICE RECORDER TO PERSONS WITH VISUALIMPAIRMENT

To enable students with visual disabilities to access standard resources and communicate better lap tops loaded with JAWS software is provided free of cost. These lap tops are available to students with visual impairments pursuing Higher Education courses such as Under Graduate Degree Courses, Post Graduate Courses, Degree Course in Engineering, Medicine, Management or any other professional courses. Students with visual impairment pursuing Senior Secondary schooling and any course thereafter are also given free Digital Voice Recorders. In the current year 250 students with visual disabilities have benefitted from this scheme. (Annexure-7)

2.7 TRANSPORT CONCESSION

To assist persons with disabilities to travel for employment, education and for accessing public services, this scheme offers persons with disabilities who can travel, concessional rates for travel on public transport. This year 90,320 number of PwD have received train travel concession and 31,840 PwD had received travel concessions for traveling by public bus. To those persons with disabilities who cannot travel alone concessions are also given to their escort. A hundred per cent concession is provided to persons with mental and total visual impairment and a concession ranging from fifty to hundred per cent to persons with orthopedic impairment for expenditure on travel in public buses. A fifty percent travel concession is also provided to the escort.

2.8 AWARD OF INCENTIVE FOR MARRIAGE TO PERSON WITH DISABILITY

To encourage marriage to persons with disabilities for their greater social inclusion and to enable them to lead normal lives with dignity a cash incentive is awarded to either spouse in a couple where one or both happen to be persons with disabilities. The amount of incentive is fixed at ₹ 50,000. This year 519 couples have been awarded under this scheme by the District Collectors. For the year 2018-19 a budgetary provision of ₹247.50 lakh was made. (Annexure-8)

2.9 SCHEME FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF RIGHTS OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES ACT, 2016

The Department of SSEPD was sanctioned 20 crore from the Government of India for the

implementation of various activities outlined in the PwD Act, 1995/2016. Activities undertaken in the year 2018-19 under this scheme are

UNIQUE DISABILITY IDENTIFICATION (UDID)

Odisha is one of the pilot states for the Unique Disability ID programme. Identification and Survey for Universal ID of PwD is underway. So far, 2,49,617 persons with disabilities have been registered for UDID and 58,430 PwDs have received their UDID. For the identification and issue of UDID camps have been organized in every District this year. This will create a database on PwDs prevent duplication of data; facilitate swifter assessment and certification of disability through Medical Boards and Hospitals and help in streamlining and tracking the implementation of the various schemes of the Government for the PwD.



Supporting PwD to lead normal social lives

ACCESSIBLE INDIA CAMPAIGN

The Accessible India Campaign is a Government of India scheme to make all public building and websites accessible and barrier-free for persons with disabilities.

In phase-1 of the campaign 50 public buildings and parks in Bhubaneswar were audited for accessibility and proposals for 30 buildings were submitted to the Govt. of India. Retrofitting work has been completed in 23 buildings (Annexure-9A). Work is in progress in 9 buildings (Annexure-9B). Proposals have been sent for 17 more buildings and funds are awaited. (Annexure-9C).

A total of 253 government websites had been indentified for re-designing to make them barrier-free. Presently 114 websites have been

re-designed and are accessible to the PwD. Efforts are on to the re-format important public documents of all departments of the government so that they can be easily accessed by the PwD.

2.10 AWARENESS GENERATION AND PUBLICITY SCHEME (AGP)

A number of events and awareness campaigns were organized during the year 2017-18 at the state and district levels to give wide publicity through the electronic and print media to the rights and entitlements of the PwD and the being run for their welfare and socio-economic empowerment by the Government. The events that were organized brought to the notice of all stakeholders and the civil society about the legal

rights of the PwDs as enshrined in the constitution, international conventions, PwD Act 1995 and subordinate legislations. The larger society was sensitized on issues concerning the PwD, the causes leading to disability and its prevention, treatment and management.

Activities for the economic empowerment of PwDs like job fairs, awareness on skill development, career counselling etc, were organized by the Department of SSEPD in collaboration with other government and PwD led organizations. Seminars, workshops, cultural activities, fairs, exhibitions etc, have also been organized jointly by the Department of SSEPD and other socially active organizations.

2.11 THE NATIONAL TRUST SCHEMES

The National Trust is a statutory body of the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India, set up under the "National Trust for the Welfare of Persons with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities Act" (1999). The National Trust carries out various schemes of capacity building, training and care & shelter through its registered organizations. A total of 313 organizations from Odisha have been registered under the National Trust Act and the PwD Act 1995 and Rights of the Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016. Some of the activities undertaken by these organizations through the National Trust schemes are:



Campaign for the creation of an inclusive society

SSEPD

DISHA: Disha Centres provide early intervention services to children with Disability and training to family members. There are three such centres in Odisha. Expenditure incurred this year amounts to ₹5.40 lakh

VIKAAS: In this day care scheme, the PwD have an opportunity to enhance their interpersonal and vocational skills as they grow in age. Presently there are four Vikaas centres functioning in Odisha catering to 30 PwD. The funds utilized by these centres in the year 2018-19 is ₹ 19.79 lakh.

SAMARTH: This scheme provides a respite home for Persons with Disabilities from poverty and low income families including destitute, orphans or abandoned, families in crisis. Two organizations in Odisha are being supported


under this scheme to run Samarth Centres. The expenditure incurred by the centres this year amounts to ₹24.0 lakh.

GHARAUNDA: This scheme provides an assured home and minimum quality of care services throughout the life of a person with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation or Multiple Disabilities. Presently five organizations in Odisha are running Gharaunda Centres and have received funds worth₹10.10 lakh.

SAHYOGI: To provide adequate and nurturing care to persons with disabilities and their families who require it this scheme provides training to care givers. In the current year an expenditure of ₹ 1.20 lakh has been done.

2.12 REHABILITATION OF LEPROSY CURED PERSON (LCP)

To provide persons cured from Hansen's disease (Leprosy) with self-employment opportunities and for their social rehabilitation, the Government of Odisha provides financial assistance as grant-in-aid to certain NGOs. A two-day workshop was held in all Districts and State Capital for the persons affected by Hansen's disease for gathering their suggestions to improve the support system for their rehabilitation. 6527 persons affected by Hansen's disease have been assisted by the Department. For the year 2018-19 an amount of ₹ 100.00 lakh had been sanctioned.

2.13 DIFFERENTIAL RATE OF INTEREST (DRI) SCHEME

In this scheme financial assistance at concessional rates are available to selected low income groups including persons with disabilities who have the necessary skills but lack the finance to set up their own business. Credit for a maximum amount of $\stackrel{?}{\sim} 20,000$ as a house loan, at the rate of 4 percent per annum and a maximum amount of $\stackrel{?}{\sim} 15,000$ for any other purpose is given to persons with disability or to institutions of PwDs pursuing a gainful occupation Repayment period is up to five years. In Odisha 3273 persons with disability have availed of DRI loans in the financial year 2018-19.

2.14. CHIEF MINISTER'S RELIEF FUND (CMRF)

Assistance for the relief and rehabilitation of the aged, PwD and those incapable of earning their livelihood are eligible for CMRF. In support of livelihood endeavours 1815 PwD have received grants upto a maximum of ₹30,000 from the CMRF in 2018-19.

2.15. AUTISM ASSESSMENT AND CERTIFICATION

The Government has framed Guidelines for Evaluation and Assessment of Autism and Procedure for Certification have been issued. Training Programmes for Medical and Rehabilitation Professionals have been organised to equip them on the techniques and

procedure for certification of Autism. State Autism Appellate Medical Board has been constituted.

2.16 CARE AND PROTECTION OF SPASTIC CHILDREN

The State Government has a scheme for creating awareness on children with Cerebral Palsy among the general population and the parents of children with Celebral Palsy. The Scheme envisages day boarding facilities and door to door attendance of Spastic children. Presently 290 children are cover by this scheme. Creating awareness among the public as well as the parents of spastic children and to provide training and education to them on cerebral palsy in order to make them self-sufficient is

also an aspect of this many fold scheme. Financial assistance is being provided to 11 Voluntary Organisations for the purpose. In 2018-19, ₹ 70 lakh was provided in support of their activities. (Annexure-11).

2.17. SKILL DEVELOPMENT:

To make Persons with Disabilities capable of earning their livelihood, Vocational Training Centres are being run by Orissa Association for the Blind(OAB), Orissa Association for the Deaf (OAD) and All Orissa Orthopedically Handicapped Welfare Association (AOOHWA). The State Government provides Grant-in-Aid towards training cost and stipend to the trainees. For this purpose, an amount of ₹ 600.00 lakh was provided in the year 2018-19 and so far 75 PwD have taken vocational training. Further to extend this facility across districts 40 organizations have been empanelled in three categories the first for conducting vocational training, second for sponsoring candidates to the vocational training centres and third for community mobilisation & creating awareness on skilling the PwD for gainful employment. Each organization has been approved for conducting vocational training for a target of 200 trainees.

2.18. THERAPEUTIC AND REHABILITATION SERVICES TO CHILDREN AND PERSONS WITH INTELLECTUAL DISABILITIES

The State Government has extended financial support that covers managerial costs to 64

NGOs working for children and adults with intellectual disabilities. In the current year these NGOs have worked for the care and rehabilitation of 2952 children and adults with intellectual disability in 22 districts. These NGOs provide day care services and residential facilities along with health care and income generating skills. (Annexure-10).

2.19 STATE AWARDS FOR THE EMPOWERMENT OF PwD

State Awards for the Empowerment of PwD were conferred on the International Day of Persons with Disability, 3rd of December, 2016. The following individuals and institutions received awards of ₹ 25,000 each from the Honourable Chief Minister Sr. Naveen Patnaik.

2.19 STATE LEVEL LIBRARY CUM RESOURCE CENTRE

The Department of SSEPD, has set up an academic resource-centre for thePwD. This library, functions as a full-fledged database provider, ensuring that material is available in accessible formats as per the type of disability. For example, availability of audio books and Braille books for visually-impaired, visual signlanguage material for hearing-impaired, sensitized learning aids for other PwDs etc.

Magnitude of Substance Use in Odisha

Findings from the National Survey on Extent and Pattern of Substance Use

The Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment conducted a National Survey on Extent and Pattern of Substance Use in collaboration with the National Drug Dependence Treatment Centre, AIIMS, New Delhi. The survey mapped the availability of services and interventions for individuals suffering from substance use disorders and identified the gaps in service delivery. This report provides both National level as well as at the State level data on the proportion of the population using various substances and those affected by substance use disorders. The major findings of the survey have been published in the report "The Magnitude of Substance Use in India" in February 2019.

The report found that alcohol is the most common psychoactive substance used by Indians. The users aged 10-75 years comprise 14.6% of the population. The prevalence of alcohol dependence is estimated to be around 2.7% with an additional 2.5% consuming alcohol in a harmful manner. The prevalence of alcohol use in the State of Odisha is 31.8% which is higher than the national average of 27.3 %. Every third alcohol user in India needs help for alcohol related problems. In Odisha, 21 lakh people need help with their Alcohol use problems.

Statistics also show that 2.8% of the Indian population reported using cannabis in the last year in contrast to 5.24% in Odisha. Of the 72 lakh individuals all over India, approximately 4.9 lakh individuals reside in Odisha and are in need of help for their cannabis use problem. The prevalence of cannabis use in Odisha is as high as 1.29% and dependence is 0.52% whereas the all India average stands lower at 0.66% and 0.25%. Odisha ranks third among the top ten states in India in terms of number of people needing help with cannabis dependence.

Opioid use among Indians stands at 2.1% of the population. Around 0.55% of Indians receive support for opioid use problems. Prevalence of opioid use in Odisha is 0.8%, dependence is 0.37% and current use is 2.85% whereas the national average is much lower at 0.70%, 0.26% and 2.06 respectively.

All over the country, the number of current users of sedatives (non-medical, non-prescription use) is 1.08% or approximately 1.18 crore people. The current use reported in Odisha stands at 1.66%. In Odisha, prevalence of sedative use is 0.31% and dependence is 0.17% whereas the Indian average is 0.20% and 0.11% respectively. Presently 1.2 lakh people in Odisha need help with their sedative use problems.


Estimates show that there are about 8184 People Who Inject Drugs in Odisha. Prevalence of ATS use in Odisha state is 0.09% and dependence 0.01%. Prevalence of inhalant users in Odisha is 0.01% and current use is 0.03%


The most significant finding of the Report is the treatment gap or the unavailability of treatment services for people affected by substance use disorders. One in 38 people with alcohol dependence report getting any type of treatment and only about one in 180 people with alcohol dependence report getting inpatient treatment or hospitalization. Among people suffering from dependence on illicit drugs, one among 20 people has ever received inpatient treatment/hospitalization or any other for help with their drug use problem.

It is evident that a sizable population in the state is affected by substance use disorders and is in need of urgent help. Scientific-based treatment services and evidence-based substance use prevention programmes are urgently needed to protect people especially the youth and the children.

Response of the Department of SSEPD, Government of Odisha.

The Department of SSPED seeks to establish a close link between substance use treatment services with general healthcare services to reduce the treatment gap. It therefore converges the Central Sector Schemes such as the "Strengthening Drug De-Addiction Programme: Establishing Drug Treatment Clinics" of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare and the "Prevention of Alcoholism and Substance (Drugs) Abuse Programme" of the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment (MoSJE) to set in place an efficient and effective prevention and treatment service for the people with substance use disorders.

The Integrated Rehabilitation Centre for Addicts (IRCA) have been equipped by incorporating additional elements such as outreach that aims at generating demand for treatment and facilitates access to services along with outpatient treatment that provides prescription medicines by qualified personnel. Residential treatment is made available to those in chronic conditions. Around 5 crore rupees were sanctioned for De Addiction centers in the 2017-18.

In partnership with faith-based organizations such as the Brahmakumari Ishwariya Vishwavidyalaya and the Vyakti Vikas Kendra affiliated to the Art of Living Foundation social mobilization and awareness campaigns on the harmful effects of substance use are being done. These organizations along with 17 Sarpanches were awarded Rs.20,000/- each for their endeavour to prevent alcohol and substance use in at the community level. (Annexure 16 (A,B,C)

3. SCHEMES AND SERVICES FOR SENIOR CITIZENS

3.1 ABADANA

In sync with the goals of the Odisha State Policy for Senior Citizens 2016, the Department has launched a new scheme this year for the welfare and protection of the destitute senior citizens. This scheme offers a bouquet of services that strive to improve the quality of life of the elderly by providing basic amenities, comprehensive rehabilitation services and programmes that shall encourage active and productive ageing. It also has research, training and awareness building components.

This year the budgetary allocation was ₹35.50 crore for supporting Homes for the Elderly and the construction of Integrated Infrastructure Complex in the Districts.

INTEGRATED INFRASTRUCTURE COMPLEX (IIC)

The Department of SSEPD has conceptualized Integrated Infrastructure Complex meant to accommodate 200 persons including the senior citizens, destitute and mentally ill persons. The IIC will have a Dairy Unit, Poultry Unit, Horticulture Farm and skill development training centres for the target population of the Department.

Funds have been allocated for 9 such complexes in the Districts of Bhadrak, Cuttack, Ganjam, Kandhamal, Khordha, Nabarangpur, Puri, Sambalpur and Malkangiri. Construction has commenced in Kandhamal, Khordha, and Sambalpur while the tender process is on for the other six.



Ensuring entitlements to Senior Citizens

Nine more IIC are planned in the mineral rich Districts of Angul, Dhenkanal, Jajpur, Jharsuguda, Keonjhar, Koraput, Mayurbhanj, Rayagada and Sundargarh. These IICs will be constructed with funds out of the District Mineral Fund (DMF).

SENIOR CITIZENS DAY

With the aim to establish a coherent, comprehensive and sustainable social framework for welfare of senior citizens in Odisha the Department of Social Security and Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities observed Senior Citizen Day in all the 30 districts of Odisha on the 1st of October 2018. The event saw participation from various senior citizens associations, civil service organizations and district level officers.

A sum of ₹60 Lakhs was allocated @ of ₹ 2 Lakhs per District for the purpose.

BAYOJYESTHA SAMMAN

The State Government has launched awards for senior citizens and institutions that support their health and wellbeing. This year the awards were conferred by the Hon'ble Minster, SSEPD, Shri Prafulla Samal in the State level celebration of International Day for Older Persons on 01.10.2018 at Bhubaneswar. 3.2 INTEGRATED PROGRAMME FOR SENIOR CITIZENS (CIPS)

This is the revised Central Sector Scheme to improve the quality of life of the senior citizens by providing basic amenities like shelter, food, medical care and entertainment opportunities and by encouraging productive and active ageing through providing support for capacity building of Government organizations, NonGovernmental Organizations, Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs), local bodies or the community at large. Under this scheme the following activities have been taken up in the current year:

MAINTENANCE OF OLD AGE HOMES

Forty Old Age Homes with a total intake capacity of 1025 that provide all basic services including medical care and opportunities for productive and active ageing. (Annexure-12)

MULTI SERVICE DAY CARE CENTRES FOR SENIOR CITIZENS / SENIOR CITIZEN HOMES

Sixty Day Care Centres for the elderly with an intake capacity of 3000 that provided day care apart from multiple services such as educational and entertainment opportunities, health services and companionship are to be converted to Senior Citizens Homes with intake of 25 residents. (Annexure-13) So far 22

proposals for such conversion have been recommended to the Government of India for consideration.

MOBILE MEDICARE UNITS

Three Mobile Medicare Units provide medical care to the elderly residing in hard to reach areas in the Districts of Puri, Khordha and Jagatsinghpur. (Annexure-14)

MULTI-FACILITY CARE CENTRES FOR OLDER WIDOWS

The state has three multi-facility care centres exclusively for older widows. (Annexure-15)

PHYSIOTHERAPY CLINIC

A physiotherapy clinic catering to the specialized needs of Senior Citizens alone is the Centre for Rehabilitation Services & Research – (CRSR), Dahanigadia, PO- Charampa, District Bhadrak.


3.3 VAYOSHRESHTHA SAMMAN

To showcase the Government of India's concern and commitment for Senior Citizens with the aim of strengthening their legitimate place in society and to make younger generations appreciate the contributions of senior citizens in society and in nation building. The awards are conferred to institutions and individuals in thirteen categories every year, on the occasion of International Day of Older Persons on the1st of October.

4. SCHEMES AND SERVICES FOR PERSONS WITH ADDICTION TO SUBSTANCES

4.1 SCHEME OF ASSISTANCE FOR PREVENTION OF ALCOHOLISM AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE

The Department of SSEPD had a budget of ₹ 5 crore in the year 2018-19, for creating awareness and educating people about the ill-effects of alcoholism and substance abuse on the individual, the family, the workplace and society at large. Each District had an allocation of ₹ 11 lakh for drug and alcohol prevention. A State level Poster Competition on prevention of substance abuse had been organized in July 2018 in which students from schools and colleges participated by sending nearly a thousand entries. Regular Preventive Education and

Awareness Generation through hoardings, marathons and rallies have been done both at the State and district level.

4.2 INTEGRATED REHABILITATION CENTRE FOR ADDICTS (IRCA)

Odisha has 34 Integrated Rehabilitation Centre for Addicts covering 21 districts of the state. These centres are supported by the Government of India and offer the entire range of community based services for the identification, motivation, counselling, de-addiction, after care and rehabilitation for Whole Person Recovery (WPR) of addicts. In 2018-19, the IRCAs have assessed 18,249 persons and successfully treated 12,729 persons with additions. Psychological services were availed by 25,946 persons and support to co-dependents was extended to 10,761 persons through the family

programme. A total of 944 cases were referred to other facilities for treatment and rehabilitation. (Annexure-16)

5. SCHEME FOR TRANSGENDER PERSONS

5.1 SWEEKRUTI

For the promotion of Transgender Equality and Justice, the Department of SSEPD has launched this novel scheme that shall strive for their social inclusion, empowerment and increased participation in public life. Under this scheme provision has been made for their survey and identification, issue of multi-purpose smart cards, assistance to parents with transgender children, pre-matric and post-matric scholarships, personality development, skill upgradation and entrepreneurship

development along with critical services such as Health Care, Legal Aid and Counselling services. This year the budget for this scheme and other services for the transgender community was ₹ 250.00 lakh.

5.2 SERVICES FOR TRANSGENDER INCLUSION

BASIC CIVIC AMENITIES FROM MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS: All the Municipal Corporations of the State are to provide basic civic amenities such as sanitation, community toilet, drinking water, electricity etc. in the transgender residential colonies under their jurisdiction.

FOOD SECURITY OF TRANSGENDER PERSONS: Food Supplies & Consumer Welfare
Department has notified for auto inclusion of the

transgender persons under National Food Security Act as beneficiaries in their individual capacity, vide Notification No. 19969 dated 28.09.2015.

RECRUITMENT: Recruitment commissions have been advised by the General Administration Department to include Transgender (TG) as a category of gender in the application forms meant for different requirements.

GOVERNMENT SCHEMES: All Departments vide UOI No. 311 dated 08.09.2016; RDCs and Collectors vide Letter No. 6509 dated 09.09.2016 and Letter No. 3094 dated 05.05.2016 have been requested to extend the benefits of existing Government schemes to the Transgender persons.





LIVELIHOODS: The Housing and Urban Development Department has been requested to provide livelihood support to all transgender persons in different local bodies under the National Urban Livelihood Mission (NULM) vide Letter No. 9369 dated 19.12.2016.

6. SCHEME FOR BEGGAR IDENTIFICATION AND REHABILITATION

6.1 SAHAYA

Beggars are the visible indicators of poverty in our society. In order to respond appropriately the Department conducted a beggar identification survey in all districts of the state. A total of 6,482 beggars were identified and a new scheme SAHAYA was launched by the Government for their protection, care and rehabilitation. An allocation of ₹. 5 crore was made in the year 2018-19 for assisting their parents, providing pre-matric and post-matric scholarships and establishing rehabilitation centres where skill development trainings, self-employment kits and other incentives would be given to them along with health care and counselling services with the goal of mainstreaming them back into society.


UNICEF-ODISHA



UNICEF- ODISHA as part of its system strengthening and services augmentation initiatives has extended its scope of activities with the handholding of the Department of SSEPD, Government of Odisha. The thrust areas are early identification of neuro-developmental disabilities leading to early intervention, capacity building through technical expertise, enhancing the accessibility

of common public services including infrastructure, social inclusion and inclusive education. The figure below captures the activities of the UNICEF-SSEPD partnership.

To scale up the handholding initiatives, efficacious and meaningful services; the SSEPD Department has also widened its wave length of impactful services for the differently able children as well as individuals through the joint initiatives of SSEPD-UNICEF and NIMHANS (National Institute of Mental Health and Neurosciences, Bangalore). Capacity building programs in the context of psychosocial rehabilitation, recuperation and service delivery mechanisms have been conducted in the State and at NIMHANS, Bangalore. The outcomes of such programs have been observed through improved quality of service delivery, experience and expertise of the professionals and functionaries.



ANAND PROGRAMME IN COLLABORATION WITH TATA TRUSTS

ANAND Programme is a unique initiative of the SSEPD Department and the TATA Trust to provide a platform to senior citizens to be aware of their rights and entitlements. It believes that the right to a dignified life can be achieved only within a vibrant community.

ANAND Programme adopts a Spokes model for greater outreach in neighbourhood

communities. The Spokes centre provides facilities for targeted communities according to their felt needs. The primary purpose of these spokes is to foster a sense of belongingness and create support systems at the community level. As a pilot, a Spoke centre dedicated to senior citizens was launched on the 1st of September, 2018 at N1 A/2, IRC Village, Nayapalli.

PRAJAPITA BRAHMA KUMARI ISHWARIYA VISHWA VIDYALAYA

The Brahmakumris is a spiritual movement and social service organization affiliated to UN and is particularly known for blending their spirituality to social service activities. In partnership with the Department of SSEPD, they have organized a Campaign for Empowering the Persons with Disabilities& ensuring inclusiveness and equality. The main objective of the campaign was to empower the persons with disabilities and educate the

mainstream society to treat the PwD with dignity and be inclusive. The campaign was inaugurated on the World Braille Day in the presence of 350 persons with disabilities at Bhubaneswar. A special exhibition of eminent persons with disabilities, 3D models of Rajayoga Meditation and a set of six motivational songs was released on this occasion. The campaign covered 102 schools of 25 districts in 42days. It is assumed that approximately 7824 students and 35929 staff and parents were educated through this campaign



(a) Identification of Cataract and referral for free surgery




(b) Distribution of Presbyopia Spectacles

INSTITUTE OF HEALTH SCIENCES -THE STATE NODAL AGENCY CENTER OF THE NATIONAL TRUST

The Institute of Health Sciences is the State Nodal Agency Center for the National Trust. It therefore promotes the National Trust Schemes along with the schemes and programmes of the Department of SSEPD.

In the year 2018-19 it has conducted several orientation and training programmes for NGOs working with the Department and for the Principals of Special Schools on the Rights of the PwD Act,2016.

It also promotes the role of the Rehabilitation

Council of India, its objectives and various courses on disability rehabilitation along with their career prospects. For the special educators and for teachers of pre-primary and primary schools the Institute organized a one day training programme for early identification of children with developmental disorders. The programme was conducted by Ms. Anita Nanda, Convener, Zonal Coordination Committee of RCI, Eastern Zone.

Apart from actively conducting Government sponsored programs, the Institute of Health Sciences, organized a seminar on the occasion of World Autism Awareness Day on the topic "Autism – Present & Future".

CHAPTER 8 BUDGET

The Department of SSEPD is supported by financial outlays in both the Plan and Non Plan Budget of the Government of Odisha. This is supplemented by grant-in-aid received from the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India under various central sector schemes. The Department receives CSR funds from various

corporate bodies. The Plan and Non-Plan budget provision for the Department was Rs.22,6709.22 crore during 2018-19 out of which Rs. 22,5031.04 crore has been utilized (99.26%). The financial statement of the sanction and expenditure for the year 2018-19 is given below:







First rehab centre for People with Disabilities to come up in Odisha

Odisha will soon have an Advanced Rehabilitation Centre (ARC) for People with Disabilities (PwDs). The centre aims at providing best services to the differently abled.

BHUBANESWAR:Odisha will soon have an Advanced Rehabilitation Centre (ARC) for People with Disabilities (PwDs). The centre aims at providing best services to the differently abled. The Standing Finance Committee chaired by Principal Secretary of Social Security and Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (SSEPD) Department Niten Chandra has approved the establishment of the centre at a cost of Rs 19.40 crore.

"The state-of-the-art centre having two components - Advance robotic rehabilitation system and Computer-Aided Design (CAD) and Computer-Aided Manufacturing (CAM) system, is first of its kind in the country," the Secretary said. The robotic rehabilitation system comprising of robotic gait trainer for locomotion therapy on treadmill, robotic orthosis for paediatric patients and self driven upper extremity functional therapy system will be used for rehabilitation of persons with neurological disorders.

It can also be beneficial for trauma conditions like stroke, cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, lower limb amputations, spinal cord injury, traumatic brain injury, broken legs or pelvis, joint injuries or replacements, muscular dystrophy or other musculoskeletal disorders.

The system can capture, design, modify and manufacture any 3D anatomical shape and/or product designed to fit that shape by replacing conventional moulds with manual art and skill. "The details of technology, its functioning and cost of equipment have been finalised in consultation with a technical committee consisting of experts from AIIMS-Bhubaneswar and Safdarjung Hospital, New Delhi," Chandra said.

Meanwhile, the State Government has made a budgetary allocation of Rs 11 crore for establishment of the ARC as a state level unit. With a capital expenditure of Rs 9.5 crore, an estimated Rs 19.4 crore will be spent for centre in the next five years starting from this fiscal. The centre will be manned by 14 persons, including 12 professionals and two patient assistants.

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



